A remarkable effort raising a club record of \$630.00.



Jim has always been a true ambassador of the sport and an inspiration to all. We are grateful for his hard work, and the beauty it has brought to the club.




Twilight Bowls remains very popular, with over 40 participants on most Wednesday evenings. The number of "new bowlers" playing and enjoying these evenings is very

ARTIFICIAL GREEN


Looking good and playing well on most rinks a brushing will take place this week.

It has been especially pleasing to see the fantastic achievement of adding over 50 new members. On the other hand, we are hopeful that a few more members will step forward and nominate for the vacant Management Committee roles or help on a subcommittee. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Congratulations to the Social Committee on arranging so many fun social activities. As I have said previously, it is vital that our club helps provide members with a healthy social network, and all the benefits that provides.

It has been refreshing to see the efforts of Ron Preto and his helpers trialling a new game (to Donvale) planned for our winter program, called Scroungers. Many members have enjoyed the fun aspects of this game. All players stay at the mat and play as individuals with driving and out of bounds bowls and Jacks penalised. The three closest bowls score points, so it is a great draw game, and you get three bowls each end. I encourage members to give it go, and hopefully it is a huge success during winter, and provides our members with even more choice.

Lower costs will be reflected in a higher profit distribution from the Pavilion Operating Account (Bar profits less building running costs). The installation is expected to be completed by September this year.

Jim has made an invaluable contribution to the club, particularly in the upkeep and maintenance of our beautiful gardens. He has been an inspiration to us all. 

One such character at Donvale is Mal Shield (Pictured) A brief insight into Malcolm's working life, his involvement at Donvale Bowls Club, and the successful experiences it provided.

Born in Melbourne in 1953.

Completed his Primary/ Secondary and Technical school education.

Enrolled at RMIT qualifying as an engineer.

During these formative years he became active in Heidelberg Rotaract becoming treasurer for the club and the Rotaract district.

It was during this period he met Jan Allan, a Canadian exchange student with the Heidelberg Rotary a 19-year-old exchange student. The Rotarians requesting the Rotaract club to include her in their activities.

The timing was perfect, known as a man of discerning taste and as luck would have it, between girlfriends, he volunteered to accept her.

Life takes romantic twists, Jan supposably swept off her feet by this persistent and suave suitor, they later married.

His working career commenced as an engineer at Siddons Industries in Heidelberg an institution, famous for the quality Sidchrome spanners and work tools.

Promotion was swift! Following on his role as an engineer took him to the Australian

Papermakers in Fairfield, later transferring to their Maryvale mill in Gippsland as assistant power engineer.

Next move to their Botany mill in Sydney, becoming the powerhouse and wastepaper engineer.

His ongoing journey with the company taking him back to the Fairfield Plant as South Mill Manager.

The APM had now been renamed Amcor, Mal was immediately promoted to Mill General Manager.

His final executive role Managing Director PMP print Australia. After constantly involved in large national roles, and the long hours it entailed he decided to start his own business doing management consulting work, sitting on boards, mergers, and acquisitions for medium sized companies, at one time travelling to Indonesia 13 times in a year.

In 2020 his workload and Covid, influencing him to retire. His interests are fishing, cycling, caravanning, travelling, Probus and family.

They have 3 children Kristy 39, Steven 39, and Michael 29. 4 grandchildren, 2 boys and 2 girls ranging in age from 8 to 11. The two oldest living in Melbourne, the youngest in Brisbane.

In 2014 he commenced bowling at Donvale Bowls Club initially attracted and enjoying 2 years of twilight bowls.

He is now well entrenched and extremely proud to be a member of such a welcoming and hardworking fun group of people.

ASK THE UMPIRE – MARCH 2023

Everyone knows that Helpful Herbert's most endearing quality is that he likes to be helpful. He recently found out that being helpful can result in some unfortunate consequences.

Recently Helpful Herbert and his opponent Nasty Norm were engaged in a tense struggle in a finals match. They were skipping of course.

On one end a misdirected opposition bowl went out very wide and towards the end of its course it rolled towards the boundary line. Helpful Herbert formed the view that the bowl would come to rest out of bounds, so being helpful he went onto the adjoining rink and stopped the bowl. Nasty Norm noisily objected to Helpful Herbert's action and called the umpire.

The umpire heard the story and told Nasty Norm he had options – he could have the bowl replayed or put the bowl where he believed it would have come to rest. Naturally Nasty Norm chose to have the bowl replayed.

There was further trouble for Helpful Herbert. The players on the adjoining rink complained to the umpire about Helpful Herbert coming on to their rink. The umpire told Helpful Herbert in no uncertain terms that he must not ever go onto adjoining rinks where play was in progress.

Later in the game a ferocious drive by one of Nasty Norm's players resulted in the jack coming to rest in the ditch with another of Nasty Norm's team's bowls rolling towards the ditch. Helpful Herbert couldn't resist his urge to be helpful, so he stopped the bowl because he was of the view that it too would come to rest in the ditch. Nasty Norm went ballistic and told Helpful Herbert that the bowl would have stayed on the green close to the jack. Nasty Norm again called the umpire.

Having heard the story, the umpire ruled that again Nasty

Norm had options – he could place the bowl where he believed it would have come to rest or declare the end dead. In this case Nasty Norm declared the end dead.

Was the umpire, right? Umpire Barry says she was right in both her interpretations of laws 37.1.1 and 37.1.3

MORAL

Don't <u>ever</u> touch an opponent's bowl. If an opposition bowl looks like staying out of bounds, let it. If an opposition bowl looks like going into the ditch, let it do so.

NOTE: Laws 37 and 38 are very complex and contain a variety of potentially unfortunate consequences for bowl and jack displacement.
